he will be connected with the E. W. Bliss Co.

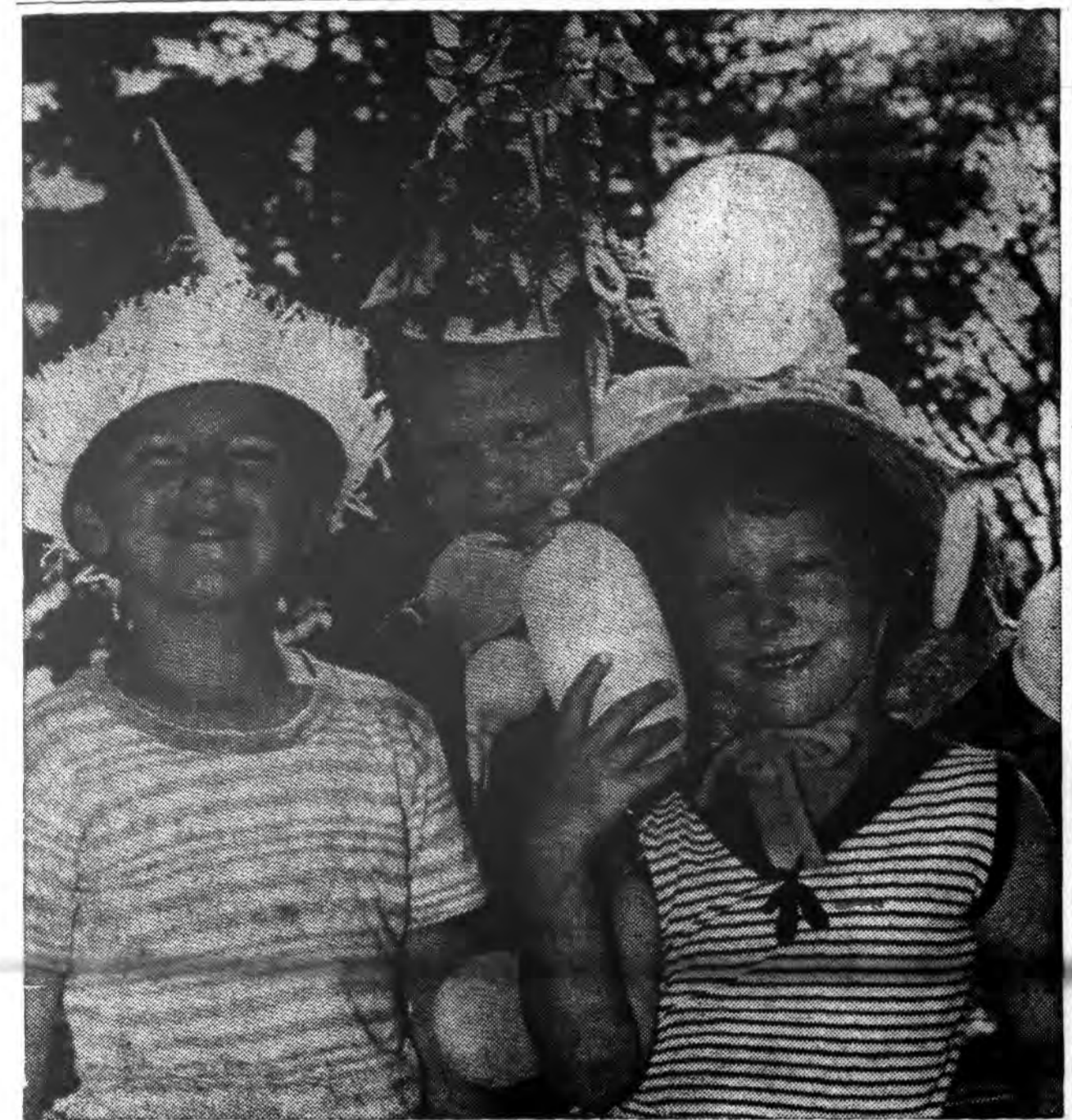

San Francisco (AP) — Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania will vacation with his family at Little Moose Lake in New York's Adirondack Mountains in the wake of his strenuous but futile bid for the Republican presidential nomination.

The decision to relax at the lake near Old Forge was announced Friday. Originally the Scrantons had planned to go to Hawaii.

Jack Conny, Scranton's press secretary, said the governor had not decided when to leave here. Scranton is due at the Pennsylvania capital, Harrisburg, Aug. 1.

The Scrantons vacationed last year at the Adirondack League Club on Little Moose Lake. The exclusive club, founded in 1895, has about 90,000 acres of forest available to it.

Little Moose Lake is about two miles long and one mile wide.

Dairy Co-op Labels Suit For \$850,000 'Harassment'

Syracuse (AP)—An \$850,000 suit against Mutual Federation of Independent Co-operatives is a "shotgun complaint" that is "without merit," an attorney for the dairy farmer organization says.

Richard Wiles, counsel for Mutual, said in a statement issued Friday that the court action had "all the earmarks of a stepped-up program of harassment of dairymen in this milkshed and their cooperatives by dealers."

Wiles contended the suit was aimed at hampering dairymen in their efforts to compete "for the sale of milk to the consumer public."

Nine dairymen filed the suit in U.S. District Court in Utica against Mutual and an affiliate, Mutual Milk Sales Cooperative Inc.

The suit charged that the co-ops conspired to divert \$500,000 in market service payments to build and maintain a non-pool plant for manufactured dairy products, and alleged that another \$225,000 was illegally diverted to solicity members "primarily from other cooperative organizations."

The suit also claimed that Mutual received \$125,000 in service payments that should not have been paid because its membership was under 6,000.

Wiles argued that "issuance of this type of shotgun complaint" was timed to have an adverse effect on Mutual's application of a licensing extension that would permit the co-op to build a plant for processing fluid milk.

Mutual's plant for manufactured dairy products is at Oneida.
