# Library lists historic books of interest to Saratoga

THE Saratoga Springs Public Library has received two books of historic interest to the Saratogians: "Fare the Well" by Leslie Dorsey and Janice Devine is a backward look at two centuries of historic American hostilities, fashionable spas and seaside resorts which contains a whole chapter on the Saratoga Spa with authentic illustrations of the period covered. "The Tavern Lamps Are Burning" an anthology of "Literary journeys through six re-

gions and four centuries of New York State" selected by the noted historian of the State, Carl Carmer. This volume, too, has a number of references to Saratoga history and places. Both books are now catalogued and available for circulation.

THE Eastern Zone of the Lutheran Laymen's League and the Lutheran Laymen's League of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Saratoga Springs have presented a gift volume, "The Book of Concord: Confession of the Evangelical Lutheran Church," to the Saratoga Springs Public Library. The library has also purchased a number of books on other faiths practiced throughout the world. Among them are:

"Nine to Five and After," Irene Silverman — the art of living and working in a big city; "The Pastor's Wife and the Church," Dorothy Harrison Pentecost; "Drama — Handbook for Churches," Alvin G. Brandt; "Gods, Demons and Others," R. K. Narayan — tales from Indian myths and legends retold in English by India's leading novelist. "Doctors, Hospitals and Medical Care," Richard H. Blum — a common sense approach; "The Interpretation of Financial Statements," B. Graham and C. McGolrick; "The Years Before School: Guiding Preschool Children," Todd; "Imagination," Harold Rugg, and "Flower Arrangement Designs for Today," edited by Helen Van Pelt Wilson. "The Flying Trapeze: Three Crises for Physicists," J. Robert Oppenheimer — three lectures delivered at McMaster University; "Quarrels That Have Shaped the Constitution," edited by John A. Garrity — 16 historians re-create "the human dramas which gave rise to epochal court decisions;" "The Economics of Soviet Planning," Abram Bergson; "Yugoslavia: One Long Summer," photograph-

"A SMALL MEXICAN," William Sprattling — with a foreword by Diego Rivera; "A History of Modern Japan," Richard Storry; "The Greeks," H. D. F. Kitto — ancient Greece as revealed in modern studies; "The Fine Art of Political Wit," Leon A. Harris.

"Best of the Best Sports Stories," edited by Irving T. Marsh & Edward Ehre; Opinions and Perspectives from "The New York Times Book Review;" "Blue Boy on Skates," M. L. Rosenthal — a collection of poems by the poetry editor of The Nation from 1956 to 1961; "More Stately Mansions," Eugene O'Neill — an unpublished play, and "Counterpoint," edited by Roy Newquist — "working philosophies of sixty-three leading writers."

In addition to the above non-fiction, the library has received a number of new novels which have been catalogued and placed on the "new fiction shelves" for circulation.
