

Woman Escapes as Car Hits Pole Carrying 4,800 Volts

MECHANICVILLE — A Saratoga woman escaped death from electrocution Thursday noon on the Viall Avenue-Saratoga Lake Road when the car she was driving smashed into a utility pole carrying 4,800 volts of "hot juice." With her car almost completely webbed with the live wires, the woman managed miraculously to get out of the vehicle on the driver's side and get to the highway.

phone lines became charged, fire and power company officials said. The fires spread over a four-mile area and kept both Arvin Hart Fire Department under Fire Chief Ray Brooks and the Stillwater Village Department busy along the "power-charged" highway. Traffic was halted to protect motorists from the live wires.

Superintendent James Driskin in the New York State Electric and Gas Corp., Mechanicville, had crews on the scene immediately but said none of the firm's wires were damaged. He noted that the telephone lines had become charged as they snapped and became entangled with the 4,800 power line.

An unusual occurrence developed at the accident scene when Lawrence Rinaldi, Stillwater, a member of the Arvin Hart Fire Co. lost two new tires from his pick-up truck when a snapping live wire whipped across the highway and became entangled with the right front and right rear tires of his vehicle. The line blew out the tires and set them afire. Marks of the coiled wire were imbedded into the sidewalls of the tires. No one was in the truck at the time, and no other damage was done to the truck.

Arvin Hart firemen closed off a four-mile area until the situation was corrected. Chief Brooks handled the situation until the arrival of State Police, who investigated.

City Gets \$1,606 for Youth Work

A total \$1,606.50 in state aid has been allocated by the State Division for Youth to the City of Saratoga for a 12-month recreation program.

An application for state aid submitted by Mayor James Murphy indicates that the City of Saratoga Springs will spend a total of \$10,061 during the year to provide a recreation program. Activities include supervised play and sports, swimming, arts and crafts, music, etc.

Facilities to be used include East Side and West Side Recreation areas and Brown's Beach.

The agency responsible for the conduct of this program is the Board of Education of which Edward Pilkington is president. The director of recreation is Bernard Fasulo.

Saratoga Springs restaurateur, Nathan Goldsmith, has been appointed chairman of the Saratoga County "Associates of the Rockefeller Team," a statewide committee working for the re-election of Governor Rockefeller and his running mates.
